

A1 Movers Reading and Writing Part 5

Description

This lesson plan has been designed to help students prepare for A1 Movers Reading and Writing Part 5. This lesson plan can be delivered face to face or online. The ‘online options’ column gives teachers ideas how the stages could be adapted for teaching online.

In this lesson, students review and practise weather vocabulary through a game, song and speaking activity. They complete a Reading and Writing Part 5 task (sentence completion based on a story).

Time required:	45 minutes (can be extended or shortened as required)
Materials required:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ A1 Movers sample task (see below - sent to parents in advance and printed if possible) ▪ Prepared presentation/PowerPoint slides ▪ Weather flashcards and What’s the weather like? worksheet (see Materials)
Aims:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ to review and practise weather vocabulary (“<i>What’s the weather like?</i>”) ▪ to complete a practice A1 Movers Reading and Writing Part 5 task

Procedure

Lesson Stages	Online options
Greet the students as they arrive.	Check they know how to switch their audio and video on.
<p>Warmer</p> <p>Play What’s the weather like? online.</p> <p>Model and drill the weather words (<i>sunny, rain, cloud, rainbow, windy</i>).</p> <p>Ask: “<i>What do you do when it’s sunny/rainy/windy?</i>”</p> <p>For extra support, use the flashcards to review the words before playing the game, or use them afterwards, and then play the game again (see Materials).</p> <p>You could write the words on the board for children to copy. They could draw pictures to go with each word, too.</p>	<p>Share your screen and sound.</p> <p>Children can type their answers in the chat.</p>
<p>Speaking – what’s the weather like?</p> <p>Ask students: “<i>What’s the weather like today?</i>” “<i>What was the weather like yesterday?</i>” “<i>What was the weather like last weekend?</i>”</p> <p>Model the activity. Display the example below from worksheet B:</p>	You’ll need to send the worksheets before the class for parents to print/display on their children’s devices. Send worksheet A to half the

<div data-bbox="76 271 715 398" style="border: 1px solid gray; padding: 5px; margin-bottom: 10px;"> <p>Berlin 15°</p> </div> <p>Say: "What's the weather like in Berlin? Is it sunny? Windy? Rainy? I don't know. But you know."</p> <p>Show this from worksheet A:</p> <div data-bbox="76 555 715 683" style="border: 1px solid gray; padding: 5px; margin-bottom: 10px;"> <p>Berlin  15°</p> </div> <p>Ask: "What's the weather like in Berlin?" (sunny)</p> <p>Model and drill "What's the weather like?" You could do a substitution drill, for example:</p> <p>[Teacher] Students</p> <p>["What's the weather like in Beijing?"] What's the weather like in Beijing?</p> <p>["Cairo"] What's the weather like in Cairo?</p> <p>["Hong Kong"] What's the weather like in Hong Kong?</p> <p>["London"] What's the weather like in London?</p> <p>Divide children into pairs – Student A and Student B. They have different worksheets (see Materials). They take it in turns to ask and answer "What's the weather like?" and draw pictures.</p> <p>To add challenge, (and practise numbers), remove some numbers from the worksheets too. Children ask "What's the temperature in...?" (It's ... degrees.)</p>	<p>class and worksheet B to the other half the class.</p> <p>Share your screen.</p> <p>Use Annotate or a drawing application (like Paint) and share your screen.</p> <p>If you can monitor students safely, put them in breakout rooms. If not, do the activity as a whole class.</p>
<p>Reading and writing</p> <p><u>Context/vocabulary</u></p> <p>Show the pictures from the text, one by one. Ask: "What's the weather like?" Introduce Daisy, the girl in the story.</p> <p>Elicit the following key vocabulary for the task:</p> <div data-bbox="89 1525 395 1688">  </div> <p style="margin-left: 20px;"><i>countryside, city, mother, father, parents</i></p> <p><u>Prediction questions:</u> "Where do you think they're going? Why?" Don't give any feedback, just praise students for giving good ideas.</p> <div data-bbox="89 1697 395 1861">  </div> <p style="margin-left: 20px;"><i>rain, house, farm, grandma</i></p> <p><u>Prediction questions:</u> "Where are they now? Where's Daisy? What's her grandma doing?" Again, don't give feedback on if their ideas are right or not, just say "Good idea!"</p>	<p>Share your screen and use your mouse to point.</p>



inside, outside, grandfather, happy, tired

Prediction questions: “Where are they now? How does Daisy feel? How do her parents/grandparents feel? Why?”

‘Meeting’ the text

The prediction questions are to help students to get ready to read. You could write a couple of their ideas on the board and set a gist task: “Read. Don’t write yet. Did you guess right?” Display the text (see **Materials**). Set a time limit of 1 or 2 minutes.

Reading and writing task

Display the example questions (see **Materials**), covering the answers. Read the first two sentences:

Daisy’s family lived in a flat in the city, but every weekend they drove to the countryside to see Daisy’s grandparents. They lived on a farm.

Read aloud the first example *Daisy’s home was in* Ask “What goes in the gap?” (*the city*)

You could highlight the text to show the referencing:

Daisy’s family lived in a flat in the city, but every weekend they drove to the countryside to see Daisy’s grandparents. They lived on a farm.

Do the same for the second example.

Set the task: “Read the story. Write 1, 2 or 3 words in the gaps” Children work individually to answer questions 1 and 2, then check their answers with a partner.

Check answers for questions 1 and 2 before asking students to move to questions 3-5.

For extra support, do more than one example as a whole class. If this is the first time children have seen this type of task, they might need lots of help. Give them plenty of praise and encouragement.

Send the task to parents in advance to print/open on the students’ screen.

Use breakout rooms for the pair check.

You/your students could write answers on the screen using Annotate, or in the chat.

<p>Answers</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1 quiet 2 (all) (the) animals 3 (noisy) trucks 4 work (outside) 5 her parents/her mum and dad/her mother and father 6 tired (and/but happy)/happy (and/but tired) 7 best farmer <p>Note: students need to answer the questions by reading the text, not just by looking at the picture. For example, the answer to question 3 is <i>trucks</i> although in the picture there are chickens.</p>	
<p>Optional extension (to do here, or after the reading and writing activity)</p> <p>Song</p> <p>Play the What's the weather like song. If you don't have access to YouTube, learn and sing the song for children. Or, create and sing a weather song together. You could add actions for younger children too!</p> <p>The song introduces other weather words from the Movers word list (<i>hot, cold, dry</i>) as well as others not on the list (<i>thunder, lightning, storm, foggy</i>).</p> <p>Today's weather</p> <p>Display a local weather forecast website (or bring one in from a newspaper). Ask children "<i>What's the weather like?</i>" in different parts of their country.</p> <p>Go to an international weather website like Accuweather. Children can take it in turns to 'read the weather' in different countries.</p>	<p>Share your screen and sound.</p>
<p>Homework</p> <p>Children could complete the Homework worksheet (see Materials) to practise another Reading and Writing Part 5 task.</p> <p>You could also share the What's the weather like? online game with parents to play with their children.</p>	

Materials

Look at the pictures and read the story. Write some words to complete the sentences about the story. You can use 1, 2 or 3 words.

Daisy at the farm

Examples

Questions

Daisy worked all afternoon in the cold, wet weather. She gave the cows their dry grass, washed some sheep and carried vegetables.



After dinner, Daisy was tired but happy. 'The best farmer in your family isn't your dad or your mum. It's you, Daisy!' her grandfather said.
