






The number of international students in higher education programs worldwide has more than doubled in less than two decades – rising from two million in 1998 to five million in 2016 – with a strong focus on STEM and doctoral programs, according to OECD's latest Education at a Glance report.

European growth ambitions

Reached current target of 350,000 foreign students by 2020 in 2017.

Germany

A new private venture has target of 100,000 foreign students by 2020.

Finland

Foreign enrolments doubled over the past decade, reaching a record 112,000 students.

Netherlands

France

Sixth-ranked study destination, hosting 309,000 foreign students in 2015/6.

United Kingdom

For the 1st time in five years, a substantial increase in non-EU students' applications to undergraduate studies - 11% growth over 2017.

Sweden

Currently developing a new internationalisation strategy to become one of the most attractive, international knowledge nations











Student Interest for UK (compared to EEA) undergraduate




Relative demand and supply

The demand for online British degrees is four times higher that of the existing supply:








The UK is mostly competing for international students with the other top English-speaking destinations.



Country perception – prospective students



Canada's international student enrolment surged in 2016



- The fastest-growing source markets were China and India (which together account for just over half of all international enrolment in the country), along with Brazil, Vietnam, and the Philippines




