#### How is Module One assessed?

Module One is assessed by written examination. The exam consists of two 90-minute papers, with a 30-minute break in between (3 hours 30 minutes in total).

Paper	Marks	Tasks
Paper 1	50%	Five tasks Labelling, short-answer and longer written responses
Paper 2	50%	Three tasks Longer written responses

#### How is Module Two assessed?

Module Two is assessed by a portfolio of coursework, including background essays, observed lessons and a professional development assignment. You will complete five assignments, which all contribute to the final grade.

Professional Development Assignment	The assignment has two parts:	
	<ul> <li>Reflection and Action (2,000–2,500 words)</li> </ul>	
	• Experimental Practice (1,500–2,000 words).	
Two Language Systems Assignments	Each Language Systems Assignment includes:	
	<ul> <li>a background essay (2,000–2,500 words) about an area of language systems and related teaching and learning issues</li> </ul>	
	• planning, teaching and evaluation of a lesson related to the chosen area.	
Two Language Skills Assignments	Each Language Skills Assignment includes:	
	<ul> <li>a background essay (2,000–2,500 words) about an area of language skills and related teaching and learning issues</li> </ul>	
	• planning, teaching and evaluation of a lesson related to the chosen area.	



## How is Module Three Option One assessed?

Module Three Option One is assessed with a written assignment (4,000–4,500 words). You are assessed in the following categories:

Grasp of topic	35	<ul> <li>Review of relevant literature in the topic area</li> <li>Understanding of key issues in the topic area</li> <li>Application of knowledge to practice and identification of key issues.</li> </ul>
Needs analysis and commentary	28	<ul> <li>Key principles of needs analysis and diagnostic testing</li> <li>Analysis of the diagnostic test and identification of learner needs</li> <li>Discussion and justification of priorities supported by the needs analysis.</li> </ul>
Course proposal	35	<ul> <li>Key principles of syllabus and course design</li> <li>Justification of learning aims, teaching approach and the course in terms of learners' needs</li> <li>Design of the course.</li> </ul>
Assessment	28	<ul> <li>Key principles of different types of assessment</li> <li>Justification of assessment procedures in terms of course design and learners' needs</li> <li>Application of assessment procedures.</li> </ul>
Presentation and organisation	14	<ul> <li>Academic writing, language and referencing</li> <li>Presentation, coherence and organisation</li> <li>Clarity of argument and quality of ideas.</li> </ul>



### How is Module Three Option Two assessed?

Module Three Option Two is assessed with a written assignment (4,000–4,500 words). You are assessed in the following categories:

Assessment categories	Maximum marks available	Assessment sub-categories
Grasp of relevant issues for ELT management	35	<ul> <li>Review of the relevant general and ELT management literature</li> <li>Understanding of key issues in your chosen specialism</li> <li>Application of relevant management knowledge to practice and identification of key issues.</li> </ul>
Situation analysis and commentary	28	<ul> <li>Understanding and application of key principles of management data analysis</li> <li>Analysis of the instruments used and identification of areas for improvement</li> <li>Discussion and justification of prioritised areas for improvement in Learning Teaching Operation, supported by analysis.</li> </ul>
Proposal and justification	35	<ul> <li>Understanding and application of key principles of strategic management and organisational improvement</li> <li>Justification of the change proposal in terms of ELT management and identified requirements</li> <li>Specification of the change and its intended effects, and of managing institutional constraints.</li> </ul>

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
