

## Speaking

#### What do I need to know about my test?

- The Speaking test takes approximately 20 minutes to complete.
- The Speaking test is a multi-level test. This means students of all abilities can take it. Some of the questions are simple and some are longer.
- Some of the test parts include preparation time, and some do not. There is a blue bar to show how much time you have to prepare. Use the preparation time to think about what you're going to say.
- You can use a pen and paper to make notes on what you are going to say.
- Listen to and read the instructions carefully before you start speaking. There will be a sound ('beep') at the start of the speaking time. Only speak after you hear this beep.
- Try your best to speak for all the time available. Speak in full sentences, give examples, expand on your ideas and try to use lots of different English grammar and vocabulary.
- The green bar on the screen shows you how long you have to speak, but don't worry if you get interrupted before the end of your answers.
- Keep the microphone the same distance from your mouth throughout the test.
- Do not touch the microphone part of your headset because this can create noise.
- Speak clearly and at the same volume throughout the test.
- Look at the sample test so that you are familiar with the types of questions in the test.

Use all the prompts you see on screen.</li> <li>Don't worry if you get interrupted before the end of your answers – you won't lose marks for this.</li> </ul>
Preparation	<ul> <li>Look through your English textbook or notebook and find questions that you have discussed in class. Find someone to practise the questions with.</li> <li>Tip: Use a variety of grammatical structures and vocabulary. In speaking tests, you need to show how much you know in English.</li> </ul>



Testing focus	Narrating a story and answering a follow-up question
Advice	<ul> <li>In part two, you will tell a story about 5 pictures and answer a follow-up question.</li> <li>You have 15 seconds preparation time, and then 70 seconds speaking time.</li> <li>During the preparation time, look at each picture carefully, and think about what is happening.</li> <li>When you tell the story, try to use as many words and grammatical structures as you can. Use all the speaking time to describe and explain as well as you possibly can.</li> <li>Be confident and imaginative – there is no right or wrong answer about the story or the advice you would give a friend!</li> </ul>
Preparation	<ul> <li>Review verb tenses you have studied: linkers, adverbs and adjectives. Using these language features makes your story more interesting and engaging.</li> <li>Tip: When you get home from school, talk about your day, or anything interesting that happened, in English. You could record what you say on a speech-to-text app. Check your errors and think about how you could improve your story.</li> </ul>

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	<ul> <li>Then you have 35 seconds speaking time to answer a question on the same topic.</li> <li>Use a wide variety of vocabulary and grammatical structures to give your ideas and compare the pictures.</li> <li>You should give opinions and support them, use your imagination and speculate about the photographs, compare and contrast the photographs.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>photographs.</li> <li>Use lots of ideas and language in your answer. There is no right or wrong answer, so try to fill up the speaking time!</li> </ul>
Preparation	<ul> <li>Review phrases for giving your opinion, comparing and contrasting, and expressing preferences. Knowing some of these phrases gives you a basic structure to help you to develop your ideas.</li> <li>Tip: When you're online, pay attention to the images you see, adverts, memes, social media posts, photos from news/sports stories. Think about what you could say about the images or talk about them with a friend.</li> </ul>

Advice	<ul> <li>In part four you will talk about a topic.</li> <li>You will see a diagram with some ideas, and you will answer three questions.</li> <li>For question 1, you have 40 seconds preparation time, then 50 seconds speaking time.</li> <li>For both questions 2 and 3, you have 40 seconds speaking time.</li> <li>Give and explain your opinion. Be confident in your ideas – there is no right or wrong answer!</li> <li>Don't worry about talking about everything on the diagram for the same amount of time – you can choose the things you think are the most important.</li> </ul>
Preparation	<ul> <li>Review phrases for giving your opinion, comparing and contrasting, and expressing preferences. Knowing some of these</li> </ul>

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
